"I'm an MD/PhD student at the University of Pittsburgh. For the past 5 years I've worked with Dr. Anne Newman, a mentor any student would be lucky to have. She opened my eyes to the world of research on aging and longevity. The first abstract we wrote together was the first I'd ever submitted to a conference. It was the 2009 American Geriatrics Society conference. The DCM award allowed me to attend without the financial burden which truly limits most students.
